## **GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR THE AGS DEGREE**

- 1. An Application for Graduation form must be filed with the Registrar's Office by the end of the second week of the fall and spring semesters, and by the end of the first week of the summer semester. Contact an advisor for assistance.
- 2. All degree applicants are required to complete the Exit Exam. A student who has earned a previous associate degree may petition the Provost for a waiver from taking the exam a second time. Students who do not take the Exit Exam or who do not have a waiver will not graduate.
- 3. Earn a minimum institutional and cumulative career GPA of 2.0 or higher for graduation.
- 4. All applicants are required to complete 62 approved semester hours.
- 5. All degree-applicable courses, including electives, must be 1000 level or higher.
- 6. Students may apply only 3 credit hours of performance courses (\*) in the Core42.
- 7. Other courses in the A&S Division numbered 1000 and above may count toward elective credit. Students are encouraged to discuss appropriate courses with their advisors.
- 8. Students may apply up to 15 hours of course work from career & technical courses, but no more than 6 of these hours may be career center hours/courses. It is the student's responsibility to verify that all elective credit will transfer to the college which the student plans to attend.
- 9. Fifteen (15) hours of Mineral Area College credit must be included in the degree.
