A Federally Funded Program

The Mineral Area College TRiO Upward Bound 1 program is funded with a five-year, \$359,828 per year grant from the U.S. Department of Education. This represents 100% of the program cost. Mineral Area College provides 25% of indirect costs to support the program.

The Mineral Area College Upward Bound 2 program is a TRIO program funded with a fiveyear, \$312,480 per year grant from the U.S. Department of Education. This represents 100% of the program cost. Mineral Area College provides a portion of indirect costs to support the program.

Upward Bound is one of five programs established by Congress to help low-income, firstgeneration students enter college and graduate. These programs are referred to as the TRIO programs.
